More than 100 education students at Kutztown University participated in the Jared Box Project this fall. The group assembled more than 65 boxes which will be distributed to local hospitals. A Jared Box is a plastic storage box filled with small gifts, toys, games and fun activities. Each box contains items selected for a specific age and gender. The boxes provide a special diversion for young patients in emergency rooms, patient rooms, surgical centers, clinics and as they receive chemotherapy and other medical treatments. Under the advisement of Dr. Deborah Johnson, assistant professor of education, Kutztown University students studied the effects of play on hospitalized children and selected items for the boxes found to be most therapeutic and effective in assisting children with cancer and other serious illnesses. The boxes will be distributed to local hospitals and clinics.



Kutztown University students and their instructor, Professor Laura Sherrod, were contacted by the Historical Society of Phoenixville to conduct a survey and determine if bodies originally buried at an old cemetery behind the present historical society were re-interred. They used a magnetometer and ground penetrating radar to search for anomalies in the soil that could potentially be bodies, gravestones and coffins left behind when the contents were supposedly re-interred at Morris Cemetery in 1925. Professor Sherrod and her students will determine the results after reviewing the collected data.

The Kutztown University Choir and Bear Voices, directed by Dr. Hank Alviani, and Wind Ensemble, directed by Daniel Neuenschwander, will present "America! A Celebration of Patriotic Music" on Saturday, November 21 at 7:30 PM in the Schaeffer Auditorium. The program will feature University Choir and Wind Ensemble performing Randall Thompson's *A Testament of Freedom*, a setting of four writings by Thomas Jefferson composed in 1943 in honor of the 200th anniversary of his birth. The program will also feature University Choir singing Robert Page's arrangement of *America the Beautiful*, Bear Voices singing *America* from West Side Story and *Song for the Unsung Hero*, and Wind Ensemble performing

American Overture for Band and *Barnum & Bailey's Circus March*. The concert is open to the public and admission is free. >>>
